In 1845, explorer Sir John Franklin set sail from England with two ships, HMS Erebus and HMS Terror, in search of a Northwest Passage across what is now Canada's Arctic. For over 150 years, expeditions have been sent to the Canadian Arctic in an attempt to learn the fate of the Franklin expedition. In 2014, there was a breakthrough when an expedition led by Parks Canada found the long-lost wreck of HMS Erebus. The efforts leading to this discovery have been run by Parks Canada since 2008, bringing together government and public, private, and non-profit organizations. The use of both state-of-the-art technology and 19th-century Inuit oral testimony made this historic find possible. In this illustrated presentation, Jonathan will share his first-hand account of both the discovery of the wreck of HMS Erebus and the exploration and study of this magnificent archaeological site to date.
